

'Sleep in a Box' plans underway

Sleep In A Box, the annual Interact Club fundraising event for local food shelters, takes place on Saturday, Sept. 26 from 7 p.m.-6 a.m., with the required student arrival time being 7-8 p.m.

Sign up forms with the \$10 pre-registration fee are due to Ms. Amanda Torbett or Mrs. Shawna Anderson by Friday, Sept. 25.

Activities will include building cardboard mansions, requiring cardboard building materials; layered man, requiring articles of clothing; and clothing relay, requiring uniform clothing of sweatpants, sweatshirt, winter coat, stocking hat, gloves and a scarf.

In order to bring items Interact Club considers to be nonessential, canned goods are donated from team members. For example, participants must pay 10 cans of food for a cell phone, five cans for a sleeping bag, or two cans for a pillow.

After the activities students will be divided up to sleep on opposite sides of the football field based on gender.

Although participants will have few restrictions, there are a few guidelines that must be followed which include: the separation of co-ed teams, a team requirement of 4-6 members, as well as the enforcement of the student handbook.

Participants will also be required to park in the east lot. No food or drink will be allowed with the exception of one sealed water bottle per person.

During the event, the area will be locked and monitored sponsors. Leaving early will not be tolerated, unless arrangements have been made between sponsors and parents.

All participants will wake at 6 a.m., and must vacate the area by 7 a.m.
